Murray gains, but others may lose

Murray has joined the Kentucky National Guard community, while many other cities have learned that they face possible loss of their units.

Murray became the new home of Detachment 1, Combat Support Company, 1st Battalion, 123rd Armor. The Company is shared with Hickman, and has an authorized strength of 52, including 47 enlisted members and five officers.

The move not only adds a community, but also helps to resolve a continuing strength problem in Hickman.

Maj. Gen. Billy G. Wellman, the Adjutant General, also advised the county judge executives and the mayors of many cities with Guard strength problems that they could lose those units. He told the local officials that the Guard needs their support if the strength problems are to be alleviated.

Since the announcement, many units have made significant gains in both recruiting and retention, but several, particularly in the Lexington area, still face serious problems.



Cash bonuses now available in 40 units

Many individuals who enlist or re-enlist in 40 Kentucky Army Guard units are now eligible for significant cash bonuses. This new program, which became effective Dec. 1, has been sought for several years and is being hailed as a major tool to bring Guard units to full strength.

Maj. Gen. Billy G. Wellman, the Adjutant General, looks at this program with tremendous optimism. "We have already had a good benefit program, with our tuition assistance, license plates, and tax benefits, but this new cash incentive will certainly give us an additional resource

as a recruiting and retention tool. I am confident that our commanders will be able to relieve their strength problems by fully utilizing this opportunity."

Under the program, a new enlistee in an eligible unit and job skill can receive \$1,500, or may accept an educational bonus of \$2,000. A re-enlistee can get up to \$1,800.

Lt. Col. Armando Alfaro, Personnel Director, said that only enlisted members with fewer than nine years of service are eligible for the re-enlistment bonus. He also noted that the individual must have been in the Guard at least a year before he can become eligible for the bonus.

The funds for this program come entirely from the federal government, and units participating were selected on the basis of mobilization priorities.

Capt. Elmo C. Head, State Recruiting and Retention Officer, said that recruiters across the state have already begun to take advantage of the opportunities to sell the Guard program. He said that the new opportunities should enable Kentucky to continue to make tremendous progress in reaching authorized strength.

A year ago, the total strength was 79 per cent. Since that time, a concerted effort in the recruiting and retention field,

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master with the Central Kentucky Sport Parachute Club near Richmond. He had three student parachutists with him, and they had planned to jump at about 3,000 feet.

When the first student stepped out of the plane, he slipped and his chute hit the plane step and the canopy opened partially. Both the parachute and the lines caught on the step and wheel of the plane, and began to drag the plane downward. By the time the plane had dropped to 1,200 feet, Specialist Owens had climbed out of the plane and wrapped his legs around the lines of the student's parachute. He was able to wrap his legs around the lines of the chute and use his head and shoulders to clear the lines from the wheel.

At 800 feet, both men were able to get free from the plane, and the pilot began to regain altitude. Both men landed safely.

The quick actions by specialist Owens not only saved the student, but probably also prevented the aircraft from crashing.

Maj. Gen. Billy G. Wellman, the Adjutant General, made the award presentation following a jump demonstration in Frankfort.

Aviators provide medical transport for South Shores

Kentucky Army Guard aviators provided emergency medical transportation for residents of Greenup and Lewis Counties for more than a month, beginning Aug. 31.

Two UH-1 helicopters were dispatched with crews to South Shores, in Greenup County, to provide emergency medical transportation until alternative transportation could be made available. The need resulted from the closing of a bridge linking the Kentucky community with Portsmouth, Ohio, where most residents have received medical care.

The bridge is scheduled to be closed for major repair for about two years.

During the month-long state active duty, the Kentucky crews flew nearly 40 emergency missions, carrying heart attack victims, women in labor, and others in need of emergency treatment. One of the most dramatic missions involved a child who had swallowed a poisonous substance.

According to Capt. Steve Moreland, who headed the mission through most of the period, the residents of the area were most appreciative of the Guardsmen and their efforts. He said that the residents treated them as members of the community throughout their stay.

Kentuckians join Prince Philip, top equestrians

His Royal Highness Prince Philip was there. The world's top equestrians were there. And the Kentucky Army National Guard was there.

Some of the Guardsmen provided security at the track, while members of the 475th Combat Support Hospital and the 441st Medical Detachment provided medical support.

Members of the hospital unit provided first aid and emergency care for many visitors and riders throughout the event. Patients arrived with problems ranging from heat exhaustion to serious injury to heart attack. Several were taken by Guard helicopter to nearby hospitals for emergency treatment.

Members of equestrian teams from around the world participated in the event, and Prince Philip was there in his capacity as president of the sponsoring organization.

Governor Carroll and other dignitaries had high praise for the Kentucky Guard's performance, saying that their participation contributed to the orderly conduct of the event, even though more than 100,000 people attended on the main day of the competition.

VA will help vets relocate friends

If you had a friend on active duty that you'd like to relocate, the Veterans Administration is willing to help by forwarding a letter you write to that veteran.

To locate an ex-service member, send a packet to your regional VA office containing the letter to the veteran in an unsealed stamped envelope with the vet's name and no return address on it.

Attach a cover letter to the VA giving the vet's full name, date of birth, service serial number and/or social security number, last known address, last known military address, rank, and service dates. Most important are full name and birthday, because with this information many vets can be located. The more information you can give the VA, the better the chances of locating the person.

If the veteran can be located, your letter will be forwarded. Then it's up to the vet to contact you.

The letter must be in the unsealed envelope so it can be screened by VA officials. No letters will be forwarded for the purpose of bill collection, harassment, or canvassing of the veteran. The letter is forwarded for you because the law prohibits giving out the veteran's address.

AT sites to cover seven states, Germany

Firm dates for annual training for all units of the Kentucky Army Guard have been established for summer camps scattered over seven states and Germany.

As it was in 1978, the largest encampment will be at Camp Shelby, Miss. June 15-30. The second largest group of Kentucky units will be attending summer training at Fort Hood, Tex. July 13-29. The 2nd Bn. of the 123rd Armor will also be at Fort Hood from July 20 to August 2.

Fort A. P. Hill will be the site of the engineers' annual training June 8-23

when the 201st Engineer Bn. and the 207th Engineer Co. arrive on the post, located in Virginia. Another Kentucky unit, the 303rd General Supply Co., will be one of the first to attend AT when they also arrive in Virginia at Ft. Lee May 12.

Alabama will be hosting two Kentucky units when the 614th MP Co. visits Ft. McClellan July 14-28 and the 307th Maintenance Co. arrives at the Anniston Army Depot April 14.

Fort Sam Houston, Tex. will be the site of AT for one of the Guard's newest and fastest growing units, the 475th Combat Support Hospital. The unit will train from July 28 through August 17.

North Carolina's Ft. Bragg will be hosting AT for the members of the 130th Maintenance Co. August 5-18.

The 1st Bn., 149th Mechanized Infantry will be completing their AT obligation between June 16-30 at Ft. Benning, Ga. The Kentucky Military Academy will conduct their necessary training between May 26 and June 9 on site at Ft. Knox

Germany will be the site of AT for the HHC 103rd Supply and Service June 2-16 and for the 413th Maintenance Co. April 28 - May 12.

Lt. Col. Harold Loy, Plans, Operations & Training officer, points out the early release of the confirmed AT dates will enable Guardsmen to inform their employers well in advance of their summer training obligations.

'ET' evolves into split assembly

The practice of "ET", or equivalent training, for the National Guard no longer exists in its familiar form.

ET, of course, was an alternate drill date when a Guardsman could not attend on the scheduled weekend.

A Government Accounting Office survey last year revealed an excess of ET's and showed that, in many cases, the Guardsman was not being trained during the ET.

The result is a "split assembly." It became effective Oct. 1.

Lt. Col. Harold Loy, head of training, says the split assembly will enable a commander to conduct meaningful training on an alternate date.

He said, "We hope if several persons cannot attend drill on the scheduled weekend, that the commander will schedule them together at an appropriate time."

Colonel Loy also noted that the new training tapes and viewers in many units will help the person who drills alone. The soldier's manuals will also be a training aid.

The new regulation states that the split assembly should be conducted within the same month as scheduled drill.
