



## OCS Class 4 - 62 Accelerated To Permit December Graduation

## New Class To Start In January

The Berlin situation—resulting in the alert of 20 per cent of Kentucky Guard units—also snapped the Kentucky Army National Guard's Officer Candidate School into increased activities and the current class is expected to graduate in December 1961 instead of the original target date of June 1962.

All candidates in the State have been attending weekend drills every week since the last of September in order to effect the stepped up program.

In addition, several candidates enrolled in the course, who were members of activated National Guard units, were given the opportunity to attend a concentrated two-week course which would enable them to be commissioned prior to entering Federal service.

Four of the seven eligible candidates attended the course at the Indiantown Gap Military Reservation in Pennsylvania. They were: SSGT Charles E. Farley, Paducah; SGT Bobby G. Smith, Paducah; PFC Alan Winkenhofer, Bowling Green, and SGT John M. Harris, Hopkinsville. All reported with the Second Medium Tank Battalion at Fort Stewart Georgia, October 28 as Second Lieutenants.

Captain William C. Morris, Commandant of the school noted that the state's OCS program is flexible and can

## Orders Step - Up Training For Seven Units

Eleven Kentucky Army National Guard companies have reported for a year of active federal service. In addition, seven other units have been ordered to step up their training in combat subjects, accept prior-service enlistments to obtain full authorized TO&E strength, and increase the number of monthly drills from four to six drills per month.

The alert for actual mobilization for 11 Kentucky units was received on two separate occasions. The first call, received August 25th, alerted the 5 companies of the 3rd Medium Tank Battalion, 123 Armor, commanded by Lt. Col. Nelson A. Meredith; and the 413 Ordnance Company, commanded by Capt. Calvin Knoop. All of these units began active duty on October 1. The Ordnance Company reported to Fort Stewart Georgia on October 7 and the Tank Battalion reported to Fort Knox Kentucky on October 10.

The second alert, received September 19, ordered the five companies of the (Continued on Page 9)



## Observation Battalion Redesignated

The 5th Observation Battalion has been ordered redesignated by the National Guard Bureau to the 5th Target Acquisition Battalion, 138th Artillery.

The new designation will authorize the organization to receive some of the latest available Army equipment, including radar and a remote controlled Drone aircraft for aerial photos and a tellurometer, valued at \$130,000, used for determining precise directions and distances of "line of site targets up to 40 miles away.

The Battalion's Headquarters Battery, commanded by Capt. Ronald J. Lynn, has been authorized a strength increase of 22 men to man the new equipment.

## THE AG SPEAKS

The tense struggle between East and West has necessitated the need for additional men to bolster the ranks of the Active Army. As in World War II and the Korean Conflict, mobilization has again been ordered for some units of the Kentucky Army National Guard.

It is a compliment that our Kentucky National Guard had units in the first alert order. Since the initial call, Kentucky has had 20 per cent of its Army units ordered to active duty. This is well above the national average of 12 per cent. This, to me, reflects the high state of readiness and excellent training of our Guard and should be a reason for all Kentuckians to be proud.


I had the pleasure of visiting Fort Knox, Kentucky, to witness the arrival of the 3d Medium Tank Battalion, 123d Armor, and I also visited Fort Stewart, Georgia, to observe the arrival of the 2d Medium Tank Battalion, 123d Armor and to visit the 413th Ordnance Company. It is gratifying to see units of the National Guard being integrated into Federal Service with a minimum of difficulty. Without exception these units displayed a very high degree of morale and esprit-de-corps which is indicative of a well trained and capable unit. It also indicates that the state of training attained by the Kentucky National Guard is close to that of our active army.

Eight additional Army Guard units have been placed in a stepped up training program which authorizes two additional drills per month. They are Hq & Hq Battery, XXIII Corps Artillery, the four Batteries of the 5th Target Acquisition Battalion, 103d Signal Company, 113th Ordnance Company and 207th Engineer Company. Should there be a further call-up, these units would probably be called into Federal Service. Again, I think this speaks very highly of the Kentucky National Guard and I am very pleased to see our units ranked among the best in the nation.

Col. William H. Webster, Commander of the 123d Tactical Reconnaissance Wing, said the percentage of donations (33%) was the highest in the unit's history.

## Ladies Auxiliary Benefit Both Hubby And Wife

Some of the wives of Kentucky National Guardsmen are finding out that their husbands have a lot of hard work to perform during that one-night-a-week drill period which, it seems, he is continually attending. One of the wives, after visiting an armory drill commented, "Why I was right surprised at all the work that was going on!"

The wives who seem to be better informed about the National Guard and what is going on are members of the two recently organized Ladies Auxiliary of the Kentucky National Guard. Both organizations were formed this year. Wives

of the enlisted personnel of Hq & Hq Co, 149th Armor Group in St. Matthews, held their organizational meeting in January and just last June, the second auxiliary using the name "National Guard Officers Auxiliary of the 201st Engineer Battalion." held their first meeting and are presently in the stages of drawing up a constitution and by-laws.

After talking with several husbands of Auxiliary members the general feeling is that the newly formed organizations help to keep the little women "off our backs" about being gone for drills and as the ladies understand more about the Guard this seems to counteract the feeling of being a "National Guard Widow.'

First Lt. Gary L. Arthur, who commands Hq Co, 201st Engineer in Ashland said "the Auxiliary gives the wives a better outlook on their husbands spending so much time at the Armory or having to go to summer camp." Lt. Arthur's wife was recently elected President of the Ashland Auxiliary.

Mrs. Arthur pointed out that her husband usually spends eight to ten hours each week on Guard business and the Auxiliary "lets me get to know the other officer's wives better, therefore I feel I know more about the people he works with at the Armory and mentions at home."

Both Auxiliaries are very active. The Auxiliary for the Armor Group even boasts a bank account of more than \$70.00. They raised this money by conducting an auction, holding a raffle for a transistor radio and holding a card party. Both groups have a membership dues which range between \$3.00 and \$5.00.

In Ashland, the gals are starting to sell Christmas cards now but soon hope to have other money making projects in progress. "Our goal is to completely decorate and furnish a dayroom in the Armory which now doesn't have much of anything in it," Mrs. Arthur reported. They will hold their meetings there when this is done. Presently they are meeting in various homes.

Picnics, homemaker projects, a Christmas dance, flower arrangement classes, Civil Defense programs and furniture refinishing are among the projects the two organizations regularly tackle. Just the last of September one Auxiliary sponsored a successful havride.

Mrs. Marion F. Williams, President of the 149th Armor Group Ladies Auxiliary, said their auxiliary trys to attend one drill per quarter when it is appropriate. In one case they sat in with the unit on a class of Civil Defense instruction. On another occasion they have served coffee and cookies during the ten minute break. At the last ANACDUTRA, the wives were served a Saturday noon meal during the middle weekend while the unit was at Summer Camp at Fort Knox.

They receive a lot of requests for copies of their Constitution and By-Laws from other cities around the nation from wives interested in forming a similar organization. Actually they patterned their organization and Constitution from information received from an Auxiliary of the Illinois National Guard.

The girls all seem to enjoy getting together for their regular meetings and both organizations, though small, seem to be growing steadily.



#### Air Guardsmen Participate In Swift Strike at Shaw AFB




