Arrival Dates Set For Kentuckians; State Status Again By 12 August

Kentuckians called to active duty during the Berlin Crisis will return to the Blue Grass State August 9 and are slated to return to State control by August 12.

Of the eleven units mobilized, the Second Medium Tank Battalion and the 413th Ordinance Company will leave Fort Stewart, Ga. on August 7. The Third Medium Tank Battalion will depart Fort Knox August 9.

All personnel will be released August 12 with the following exceptions:

1—Personnel attending service schools who volunteer to complete classes will remain on duty.

2—Those personnel who volunteered to remain for a full year.

3—Those who have enlisted in the regular Army.

4—Those who are now in Army hospitals.

Guard Tankers To Share Facilities With Reserve

Construction of a new National Guard Armory in Hopkinsville is closer to a reality with approval of preliminary plans and drawings received from the Engineering Staff of the Department of Finance here, and the National Guard Bureau in Washington.

Major General Arthur Y. Lloyd, The Adjutant General of Kentucky has notified Lawrence Casner, of Madisonville, Architect for the \$235,000 project, to begin final plans and specifications.

The Hopkinsville Armory is the third of five new National Guard Armories to receive approval for final plans. New Armories for Marion and Campbellsville were approved on April 20.

The two remaining Armories, which are presently on the drawing board, are scheduled for Glasgow and Monticello.

The Hopkinsville Armory is the largest proposed for construction this year. It will be the first Armory in Kentucky which will provide facilities for joint use of both National Guard and U. S. Army Reserve units. Originally, both the National Guard and Reserve were planned separate armories but, for economy reasons, the original National Guard Building was expanded from 15,007 square feet of floor space to 18,672 square feet of space in order to provide office space for the Reserve organizations.

Two National Guard units, which are presently on active duty at Fort Knox, (Ky.) will occupy the new building. These will be the Scout Platoon of Headquarters Company and Company B, of the Third Medium Tank Battalion, 123d Armor.

These units were called on active duty during October 1961 at the height of the Berlin Crisis.


The hardships and sacrifices imposed on you and your families were accepted and overcome in a manner in which all Kentuckians are extremely proud.

General G. Lee McClain Armory Dedicated in Bardstown

Saturday June 23d will be remembered as the "Lee McClain Day" in Bardstown for this was the day that the new National Guard Armory was dedicated in the name of former State Adjutant General, Brigadier General G. Lee McClain.

Governor Bert T. Combs and Major General Arthur Y. Lloyd and Bardstown Mayor W. G. A. Sympson were on hand for the dedication ceremonies which were held in the new building beginning at 2:30 P.M.

During his speech, Governor Combs complimented the Bardstown National

Guard unit as "one of the best in the State" and paid tribute to Lee McClain as a "real Kentuckian." He called the new building a symbol of progress in Kentucky.

General Lloyd pointed out that five armories have been completed during Governor Combs' administration and "plans are going forward on five more."

Continuing, General Lloyd said "I know of no man in the State who has done more to promote the National Guard than Lee McClain."

General McClain expressed his appreciation for the honor bestowed upon him and told the crowd, "I still have the same idea about the National Guard that I had 26 years ago. "The citizensoldier is of great importance in time of peace and war." "All the wars in which America has fought have been won by citizen-soldiers," he said.

Lt. Col. Sam K. Cecil, member of the State Headquarters Staff, served as master of ceremonies for the program. Cecil was a member of the Bardstown Guard unit when General McClain was Adjutant General, (1936-40).

The new armory, which replaces an armory shared with the American Legion in Bardstown, is a \$92,000 modification of a Guard storage facility. Battery C, 2d Howitzer Battalion, 138th Artillery commanded by 1st Lt. Harold O. Loy is now occupying the building.

The Guard's 202d Army Band, of Ashland, and members of Battery C, formed an honor guard for the arrival of Governor Combs by helicopter. After the dedication ceremonies, the band participated in a parade in Bardstown which heralded the opening of the fourth season of the "Stephen Foster Story," an outdoor drama held at Bardstown's Old Kentucky Home State Park.
