Director of Air Guard visits wing, begins 25th Thunder

Mass swearing-in broadcast live on Louisville television

Lt. Gen. Stanley E. Clarke III, director of the Air National Guard, toured the Kentucky Air Guard Base April 11-13, meeting Airmen from units across the 123rd Airlift Wing and kicking off Thunder Over Louisville, one of the largest air show and fireworks displays in North America.

Clarke also inspected the wing's unique mission capabilities, including the only fully operational contingency response group in the Air National Guard and a special tactics squadron that combines both combat control and pararescue functions, according to Col. Barry Gorter, commander of the 123rd.

"It's always good to get out of the office and talk to Airmen in the field," Clarke said of his visit. "That's the best part of my job."

He was especially interested in learning more about the contingency response and special tactics units here.

A contingency response group functions as an "airbase in a box," Gorter said, providing the ability to rapidly establish an air cargo hub

All along the way, he asked specific questions.

I believe that Lt. Gen. Clarke is engaging by nature, but he was also getting a litmus test of the technical competencies of each member — and he was impressed. It's my belief that Lt. Gen. Clarke left Kentucky with a feeling that we are a quality organization that 1) deploys often, 2) wins a lot of honors (15 Outstanding Unit Awards), 3) is comprised of many friendly faces, 4) takes care of each other (his wife was elated that their son-in-law is now a KYANG member), and 5) is an organization that he can count on — a wing that needs expansion, not reductions.

Think about it: We had the director of the Air National Guard here for three days (unheard of). He was able to swear in his son-in-law (and brought in his wife, two daughters, grandchild, son-in-law's parents and son-in-law's siblings — it was a family reunion!). He witnessed the best air show and fireworks in the country. He was so impressed by his base tour, that his wife and daughter asked to see portions of it on Sunday morning (and did).

If you were one of the members who planned or participated in the weekend's events, thank you! If you were unable to, thank you as well! The mantra of excellence runs much deeper than those who showcased our wing April 11-13. Nothing happens without the 1,200 members of our wing who demand excellence as the standard.
