Lieutenant governor welcomes returning Kentucky Airmen

More than 70 deployed to Africa to fight Ebola outbreak

Lt. Gov. Crit Luallen visited with more than 70 members of the 123rd Contingency Response Group here Dec. 6 to welcome them home from a deployment to Africa, where they supported Operation United Assistance, the international effort to fight Ebola.

"I am here to personally thank you on behalf of Gov. (Steve) Beshear," Luallen told the Airmen. "We are proud to know our people from Kentucky were part of such an important mission." The Airmen, most of whom deployed overseas Oct. 2 and returned to Kentucky in late November, established an air cargo hub in Senegal that funneled more than 750 tons of humanitarian supplies and equipment into West Africa, where the worst Ebola outbreak in history has claimed more than 6,300 lives.

Luallen told the Airmen that she and the governor have tremendous respect for the men and women of the Kentucky Air National Guard.

"We know what a great job you do and are truly grateful for your service," she said.

Kentucky's adjutant general, Maj. Gen. Edward W. Tonini, echoed Luallen's sentiments.
