The Building Blocks of Success

We are excited to announce that the Appalachian ChalleNGe Academy has been accepted into a new national initiative for career coaching and advocacy. This program will open doors for further education, career opportunities, and a variety of opportunities explicitly in alignment with the Youth ChalleNGe Program within a (24) month post-residential phase. "I am excited that our organization is pioneering a new way forward to not only challeNGe our youth, but provide a mechanism that allows each cadet the opportunity to find themselves", stated Director Josh Coldiron. With the slogan of "Helping YOU find YOU, this new initiative will truly revolutionize what it means to be a Graduate of the Appalachian ChalleNGe Academy.

The Blueprint

We have incorporated new classroom instruction which enables our cadets to use online resources to create a comprehensive plan to find and access information and opportunities that can help them get a start at pursuing a career. Cadets are guided through researching different careers using current U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics data to help understand the demand for certain types of labor, wages and current cost of living concepts, what requirements must be met to enter certain job markets, and what steps can be taken NOW to start building a path towards success in their desired career field. Guest speakers from the community are invited to speak directly with cadets and answer questions about popular, accessible careers. Topics may include requirements to overcome barriers to entry and varying compensations. Each cadet will bring this plan with them after they graduate and enter the Post-Residential Phase.

The Assembly

Once graduates have entered the Post-Residential Phase, they are returning to their communities with a new mindset generated from their 8-Core Component curriculum, the blueprint they prepared from career research, and the now 24-month support of our academy-based Resource Advocates. The combination of these tools and resources creates the foundation that our graduates can build into successful futures. The addition of our Resource Advocates also enables us to enrich the community-based support for our cadets upon their return home. Resource Advocates will build partnerships with community stakeholders and compile what resources are available within our servicing areas to provide more focused information and potential connections to graduates during their regular check-ins each month to help them as they face obstacles along their path to success.


Government in Action

A Tour of the Kentucky Capitol Eyes of a Cadet

This month's field trip to Frankfort began with an educational journey into the heart of democracy—a tour of the State Capitol Building. One such invaluable experience is a visit to the Pine Mountain Settlement School, a non-profit organization located within our county, dedicated to enriching lives through Appalachian place-based education for people of all ages. For our cadets, this visit to Pine Mountain Settlement School unfolds as a series of workshops, carefully
